PETITIONS SUBMITTED

1 Crossing Refuge - North Deeside Road, Cults

“We the undersigned petition the Council to install a crossing refuge near the junction of Abbotshall Road and Westerton Road.

As local residents are having difficulty crossing from the bus stop near the above junction, we request that consideration be given to providing a crossing refuge. The volume of traffic at significant times of the day is high and the junction causes extra congestion making it difficult to judge how to cross safely. The elderly, the young and parents with buggies and toddlers are all bus users, and the problem is growing as traffic through Cults increases.”

2 Clean up Aberdeen Harbour Beach and Coastal Path

Statement:

We the undersigned petition the council to perform a clean up and necessary maintenance of the Harbour Beach below Torry Battery, where littering and flytipping has reached an unacceptable level.

Justification:

Something must be done regarding the amount of litter at the harbour beach/coastal path below Torry Battery. Not only can litter be found on the beach itself, but large amounts of household waste appear to be dumped down the side of the cliff from the road above.

Many people regularly enjoy visiting this beautiful area of the city to watch the local wildlife. At weekends the beach is always busy with photographers, dog walkers, young people and families. Considering the numerous health benefits of spending time outdoors, this area is an invaluable asset to the local community.

Excessive litter is not just an eyesore but dangerous to the people and pets who enjoy this beach. Litter poses a significant threat to the environment and marine wildlife, particularly seabirds. It's also unacceptable that children should have to play and rock-pool amongst empty beer cans and other waste.

Few cities can boast such an excellent dolphin watching spot so close to its centre – something Aberdeen City Council is seriously undervaluing. Aberdeen has huge potential to attract wildlife tourism; if only its natural spaces were given the attention and protection from vandalism that they deserve.

I propose the following measures to be undertaken:

An initial intensive clean up of litter by council staff AND invitation to the general public to help. People putting in hard work will be less likely to litter or to tolerate others doing so;

Following this, regular litter collecting by the council to avoid the beach getting in such a bad state again;

Improved waste collection services in the local area if this is the root cause of the fly tipping;

Additional bins on the beach itself and not just in the car park;

Signage prohibiting fly tipping and explaining it to be a chargeable offence;

Improved signage showcasing the fantastic wildlife which can be seen in the area;

Closing up of the stone shelter opposite the car park which encourages antisocial behaviour;

Education of local school children in Torry as to the effects of littering on marine wildlife, drawing special attention to their local harbour beach; and

General maintenance/leveling of the paths leading down to the beach and around the base of the cliff. This will make it safer and more accessible to all.

3 Marischal Square Investment

We the undersigned petition the council to The public wants to know the details of the investment decision process that Aberdeen City Council followed from the initial idea to vacate St. Nicholas House through to the award of contract to Muse/Aviva for the Marischal Square development that ultimately led to the council's decision to deliver guaranteed annual lease payments to Aviva over 35 years for a hotel, retail and office space at Marischal Square. The Information to be provided should include, but not be limited to, the following: • The key stages of the investment decision process. • The qualifications, skills and experience of those tasked with managing and executing the process. • The documentation produced to support the decision. • The stakeholder engagement programme. • Effectiveness and relevance of each and every consultation process. • The advice given to the council regarding State Aid implications. • The steps taken to alienate the Common Good Land.

The council should present the information at a formal meeting hosted by the Convener of the Finance, Policy and Resources Committee. Sufficient time should be set aside for questions and answers at the end of the presentation.

Representatives from the following organisations and interested parties should be invited to attend:

City Centre Community Council;

Common Weal Aberdeen;

Reject Marischal Square Development campaign group;

Stop the Desecration of Marischal Square campaign group;

Any other campaign groups who opposed the Marischal Square development; and
The local press.

A TREE FOR EVERY CITIZEN / DEER CULL DISCLOSURE REQUEST

1. The Committee had before it the following petition which had been submitted by Ms Suzanne Kelly:-
"A Tree For Every Citizen / Deer Cull Disclosure Request

We the undersigned petition Aberdeen City Council as follows:-

1. To immediately halt all planned deer culling in the city, at the very least until new population measurements can be taken. The SNH recent count shows a very low number of animals. We do not believe that having the small population which SNH guidelines recommend is viable for a healthy herd, we cite the previous larger number of animals on Tullos Hill (for instance) which existed for decades;
2. To explain how the SNH guidelines that are being used on Tullos, allowing for only 4-6 animals to be allowed to live on the hill, will result in a healthy herd and healthy gene pool. We remind the city that the SNH guidelines regarding deer are just that - guidelines, and there is no legal reason to follow them to the letter. The number of animals city wide, where possible by location, should be shared with the public;
3. To actively work with Police Scotland to detect and deter further illegal poaching, as happened on Tullos Hill in January of this year;
4. To erect deer crossing warning signs to motorists in strategic spots. The city seems to claim deer were indicated in 30 vehicle accidents recently, but no signs give motorists any warning of potential hot spots. Such signs are used to good effect elsewhere in the UK and throughout Europe. The city has indicated 'people ignore signs' - we feel that is not an acceptable way to try and prevent accidents. We note the city uses numerous signs directing motorists which are heeded; and

5. To fully disclose all expenses the city has incurred in the last 8 years with regard to deer culling, tree planting, related consultants, fencing, herbicides, monies paid to the SNH, the Forestry Commission - any and all costs which planting during all phases of A Tree For Every Citizen scheme. The city is also to disclose any and all risk matrices created for the herbicides used (and indicate what chemicals were used) and the deer culling - or indicate whether such risk assessments were carried out.

The city was made aware of thousands of objections to the deer cull on Tullos Hill, which was carried out several years ago to aid the 'Tree For Every Citizen' scheme and to implement non-binding SNH guidelines. The city not only proceeded, but it insisted that the methodology it pursued was good value for money. Disclosing the requested information and carrying out the requested actions will determine the facts."

The Convener explained the process and invited the lead petitioner to present her case to the Committee.

Ms Kelly, the lead petitioner, spoke to the petition, by way of presentation, and advised that over 250 residents called for the following action: (a) the immediate cessation of the arbitrary deer culling in Aberdeen city – at a minimum until a count was undertaken; (b) the complete disclosure of all costs associated with the 'Tree for Every Citizen scheme' across the city; and (c) a comfort letter should be sought from Scottish Natural Heritage and the Forestry Commission to avoid any further taxpayer liability for this scheme. Ms Kelly spoke to each of the aforementioned requests wherein she advised of the background to and rationale for each.

Officers advised on the current position with deer culling and the Tree for Every Citizen scheme, explaining in particular that it was a statutory duty for all local authorities to produce a deer management plan and that Aberdeen City Council's plan was currently being drafted and would be reported to a future meeting of the Communities, Housing and Infrastructure Committee. Officers confirmed that the plan would address the queries raised in the petition.

The Committee resolved:-

- (i) in respect of point (1) of the petition, to note that a deer management plan, which would address these queries, would be submitted to the Council's Communities, Housing and Infrastructure Committee later this year;
- (ii) in respect of point (2) of the petition, to note that the deer management plan would estimate the population as a snapshot and assess the impact of deer on habitats, deer welfare (from weights, deformities etc), damage to crops, public safety etc and that this would also explain how officers implemented SNH guidelines;

- (iii) in respect of point (3) of the petition, to note that officers continued to work with Police Scotland to detect and deter further illegal poaching and that this was an operational matter;
- (iv) in respect of point (4) of the petition, to request officers to report on deer crossing warning signs to a future meeting of the Communities, Housing and Infrastructure Committee;
- (v) in respect of point (5) of the petition, to request officers to provide the information requested to the petitioner; and
- (vi) to thank the petitioner for her attendance and presentation.

PELICAN CROSSING ON GREENBRAE DRIVE, ABERDEEN

2. The Committee had before it the following petition which had been submitted by Ms Louise Ellis on behalf of Greenbrae Parent Council:-

“We the undersigned appeal Aberdeen City Council to install a pelican crossing on Greenbrae Drive, Aberdeen to ensure the safety of our children”.

The Convener explained the process and invited the lead petitioner to present their case to the Committee.

Mrs Gill Bruce, spoke to the petition on behalf of Greenbrae Parent Council and advised that it had been brought to their attention that the current road traffic system at the top of Greenbrae Drive (at the junction with Dubford Road) was dangerous for children.

She explained that the road layout was changed in 2014 and this meant that traffic travelling down Greenbrae Drive now had to give way to traffic from the opposite direction. Despite this change to the road layout, cars still travelled on the road at some speed and it was also causing confusion for children crossing the road. The present system led children into a false sense of security as when they came to cross the road they saw that the traffic in one direction was stopping and they often presumed that the other side was going to do the same and this was not always the case.

She advised that Greenbrae Parent Council felt strongly that a pelican crossing should be installed at that location on Greenbrae Drive to make it safer for children crossing from the Greenbrae estate (where Greenbrae Primary was situated). She also highlighted that the new housing developments at Dubford and Shielhill were creating additional traffic in the area and therefore it was expected that the amount of vehicles on the road was only going to continue to increase.

Officers provided a detailed background to the design of the current traffic management system on Greenbrae Drive and the rationale for this.

The Committee resolved:-

- (i) to request officers to report on the terms of the petition, as well as on all traffic management options at the location on Greenbrae Drive, Aberdeen to a future meeting of the Communities, Housing and Infrastructure Committee; and
- (ii) to thank the petitioner for her attendance and presentation.
