- (iv) in relation to item 6 (Taxi Fare Review), to note that officers were still to explore ways in which any future increase in airport access charges could be mitigated by the Council in a timely manner.

IMMIGRATION ACT 2016 - IMPLICATIONS FOR TAXI AND PRIVATE HIRE CAR DRIVERS - CG/16/154

5. The Committee had before it a report by the Interim Director of Corporate Governance which outlined the implications of the Immigration Act 2016 in relation to the Taxi and Private Hire Car Licensing regime.

The report recommended:-

that the Committee -

- (a) agree to give delegated powers to the Head of Legal and Democratic Services, to grant taxi and private hire car driver licences for those applicants whose leave to remain in the UK is time limited for such period as appropriate; and
- (b) otherwise note the report.

The Committee resolved:-

to approve the recommendations.

KNOWLEDGE TESTING FOR PRIVATE HIRE DRIVERS - CG/16/153

6. (A) In terms of Standing Order 10(1), the Committee received deputations from:-

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(1) Mr Mark Cullen who advised (a) that he had undertook a canvassing exercise of taxi driver opinion in person and also through two social media websites devoted to the trade in the city and it revealed that 100% were in favour of the current knowledge test being applied to all private hire drivers; (b) there were several hundred private hire drivers on the circuit who have not undertook any formal training or passed the Council's street knowledge test; and (c) that the taxi driver trade universally welcomes this development and supports the recommendations of the report.

The Committee asked a number of questions of Mr Cullen.

(2) The Committee then received a deputation from Mr Chris Douglas who advised (a) that taxi and private hire drivers were two completely different functions within the licensing regime that serve a wide range of functions within the hire and reward industry and if we start to treat them the same, we will start to create significant issues for business, drivers and the public alike: (b) that the present two tier licensing system works very well and is designed to allow an operator to carry out their business safely and legally within a framework that mutually benefits and safeguards both the public and the licence holder; (c) that the root cause of most of the problems that exist within the industry is the fact that the same knowledge test was applied to both taxi and private hire drivers which alienated a huge part of what should now be a very well established and evolved industry in the city but comparatively we are very much behind; (d) that the industry has a shocking reputation with the public, faith in our industry's services is at an all-time low and people are desperate for other options; (e) that there is a need for a full transparent survey into unmet pre-booked demand in the city; and (f) that the way forward is to establish a test and framework that truly works in the city for the people and businesses of Aberdeen and not just for the market leaders who have continually lobbied to create a monopoly in the market place that benefits only them and a minority of drivers.

The Committee asked a number of questions of Mr Douglas.

(3) The Committee then received a deputation from Mr Gavin Johnston who advised (a) that the Committee should defer consideration of imposing the knowledge test for private hire drivers until a proper survey is conducted which will take into consideration the people of Aberdeen and to undertake a consultation with Taxi and Private Hire Operators taking into consideration all modern reasons and technology used; (b) that since the Council abolished the test for private hire drivers, there has been a great improvement in the reliability of service provided to the public and the positive feedback from the people of Aberdeen; (c) that there has been no negative feedback on the service provided or complaints received from the public; (d) that the knowledge test for private hire drivers is no longer needed and the Council must listen to the needs of the public and the people of Aberdeen; (e) that, his company had invested heavily in technology that gives the customer what they want providing quotes to pay up front and also sending a picture of the driver and details of the car so the customer can track the car once it is booked; and (f) if a knowledge test is imposed by the Council, then it should only relate to emergency procedures or places such as hospitals, police stations, rail station, bus station, hotels etc. and be easily accessed by new entrants.

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The Committee asked a number of questions of Mr Johnston.

(4) The Committee then received a deputation from Mr McColl, Aberdeen Taxi Centre, who advised (a) that there would be difficulties for drivers not tested if technology (SatNav) was to fail; and (b) that if the test is adopted for everyone then there would be a consistency with the service provided by the trade, therefore providing a better experience for customers.

The Committee asked a number of questions of Mr McColl.

(B) The Committee had before it a report by the Interim Director of Corporate Governance which provided information in relation to Section 64 of the Air Weapons and Licensing (Scotland) Act 2015 which came into force on 1 November 2016. The Act gave the Licensing Authority the ability to require applicants for a private hire car licence to take a knowledge test prior to the grant or renewal of the licence and to extend the current knowledge test to private hire drivers.

The report recommended:-

that the Committee -

- (a) approve the introduction of a knowledge test for private hire car drivers applicable to any application lodged on or after 1 November 2016; and
- (b) agree to extend the current knowledge test to private hire drivers.

Councillor Malone, seconded by the Convener moved:-

that the Committee approve recommendation (a) above and instruct officers to review the current street knowledge test for taxi and private hire drivers, consulting with both groups and report back to the Committee at its meeting on 18th April 2017.

Councillor Nicoll, seconded by Councillor Copland moved as an amendment:-

That the Committee (1) defer any decision to introduce a street knowledge test until the review of the current testing regime is reported to the Licensing Committee at its meeting on 18 April 2017; and (2) instruct officers to consult with representatives of the taxi trade and private hire sector to report back to the Committee at its meeting on 18 April 2017.

On a division, there voted:- <u>for the motion</u> (8) – the Convener and Councillors Delaney, Graham, MacGregor, Malik, Malone, Milne and Finlayson; <u>for the amendment</u> (5) – Councillors Allan, Copland, Hutchison, Nicoll and Townson.

The Committee resolved:-

to adopt the motion.

The premises:

The HMO application:-

The HMO licence application was received by the HMO Unit on 18 February 2016.

HMO upgrading works and certification:

The HMO Officer carried out a joint initial inspection of the property with an Officer from Scottish Fire & Rescue Service on 29 February 2016, then he wrote to the applicant listing the following requirements to bring the property up to the current HMO standard:-

- 1. An IP44 light fitting to be installed in the bathroom.
- 2. Faulty or missing lightbulbs to be replaced.
- 3. Additional electrical sockets to be installed throughout the property.
- 4. Carbon Monoxide detectors to be installed in every room containing a gas appliance.
- 5. All portable heaters to be permanently removed from the property.
- 6. The locks on the flat exit door must be replaced with a lock of a type that is able to be opened from the inside without the use of a key.
- 7. Any locks in the doors of the letting bedrooms must be of a type that are able to be opened from the inside without the use of a key.
- 8. All self-closing doors must be adjusted to ensure that they fully close against their door-stops.
- 9. All windows to be adjusted to ensure that they open and close properly.
- 10. The kitchen worktop to be sealed where it adjoins the tiled walls.
- 11. The general housekeeping must be improved.
- 12. A chest of drawers must be installed each letting bedroom.
- 13. The bathroom to be upgraded as discussed with the HMO Officer.
- 14. The Certificate of Compliance, Gas Safe Certificate, Electrical Installation Condition Report, PAT certificate & a copy of the Tenancy Agreement to be submitted to the HMO Unit.

At the date of this report, the only item outstanding is the submission of the PAT certificate.

SFRS confirmed that they are satisfied with the fire safety arrangements within the property.



- The HMO licence application under consideration is a 'first-time' application.
- The meeting of the Licensing Committee on 7 February 2017 is the last meeting before the one-year deadline therefore if the above-mentioned PAT certificate has not been submitted by the day of the Committee, and the Committee are minded to refuse the application, they must do so at the meeting on 7 February 2017. 





We write to you to object to the application made regarding a licence for an HMO at 152 Clifton Road, Aberdeen, AB24 4RB.



Thank you for your letter dated 20 December 2016.

With reference to the objections that has been made in writing dated 12/12/2016, I would like to make the following comments/observations.

During my time managing this property there has been three concerns raised by the objector's partner

1/ During tenancy; 01 July 2013 – 30 June 2014:- Noise slamming doors and recycling at the front door.

2/ During tenancy; 14 July 2014 – 13 July 2015:- Noise people arriving and leaving, a party was being held.

3/ During Tenancy; 01 August 2015 to present (currently expires 31 July 2017):- Report of wheelie bins over flowing and rubbish lying around garden, see photographic evidence attached which was sent to the HMO depart at the time showing offending bag of rubbish and the condition of the front garden. Attended and removed the offending bag.

Both were responded to within 24 hours, a full investigation was carried out including contact with the other neighbours, the concerns were addressed and noted with the tenants and the complainant.

- Measures taken regarding the recycling, if there is recycling tenants are now instructed not to leave out side in between collections.
- A second wheelie bin was purchased and put in place
- If there is any excess rubbish tenants know that they have to dispose by themselves at the local recycling centre or to call me to collect if they have no means of getting there.

 Aberdeen City Council literature of Anti-Social Behaviour was provided for information to tenants on both occasions and one remains within the property, with a short brief of "Being Conscious of Neighbour"

There is a gardener instructed David Vass,

who attends to garden maintenance on a regular basis between the months of Mar – Oct. Attends approx. every 4 weeks weather dependant. There is two boundary hedges to the front, one hedge to the rear and a boundary fence. There is gravel chips to the front drive and paving stones to the rear there is no grass.

I am not aware of any instances of tenants parking across the driveways.

I am not aware of any hedge cuttings being left behind.

I am not aware of any cigarette butts or condoms being in the landlords garden and neighbouring properties.

When seeking tenants, applications forms are completed, references sought and when necessary guarantors. This is to ensure that appropriate tenants are found.

Sheena Morris is currently residing in Abu Dubai and will be returning home to the UK in March 2017. I am the currently the appointed contact/agent for Sheena's property. Neighbours and other agents are aware that I am currently the first point of contact and I have made my mobile number and email address readily available. I also note that Sheena is contactable on email and telephone, subject to time differences.

To my knowledge and the landlords knowledge there has been no previous concerns/complaints during the HMO licences that have been held in this property prior to July 2013.

I shall be attending on the 7th February 2017 to the Licencing Committee meeting.

I also enclose the certificate of compliance for your records.



Hello,

I want to make an objection to a planning application for HMO license at the above address. I can't seem to find how to do it online so I thought I'd start here.

I live with my family at , and we have a parking permit to park on St Machar Place. I have just seen a notice regarding this application for HMO at 35 St Machar Drive, and wish to formally object to the application on the following grounds:

- 1. The house in question has, to all neighbourly appearances, been operating as an HMO for many years now. There have been several students living at this premises for more than two years, so I object on the grounds that the owner is just now applying for permission to operate as an HMO when in fact they should have done so long ago.
- 2. There are currently three other houses on St Machar Place operating as HMO residences. With those many students have also come many more cars, and it is increasingly difficult for those in "normal" residence like myself to find a place to park. I have three children, one of whom is disabled, and many times I've had to park much further away than is reasonable. Not to mention that many of these students are parking their cars illegally, making it difficult to navigate the small cul-de-sac. There are currently five parking spaces on St Machar Place, in addition to the few driveways. This is not enough to support the HMO residences we currently have, let alone add another.
- 3. In my experience in the last 5 years at my current address, with these HMO residences come a lot of people in and out of the neighbourhood who don't live here, making it difficult to know when something is not right. For instance, I saw someone lurking at one of the houses a couple of weeks ago whom I'd never seen before. I could not tell if he lived there as the students revolve every year, and I did not feel comfortable approaching him as again I don't know any of the students well enough.
- 4. The students in these HMO residences continue to have parties every year that last late into the night. I've had the students whose garden adjoins my garden holding bonfires of hazardous proportions and throwing bottles into this fire in the past. The state of that garden and house were shocking, making the area look and feel less appealing. The noise aside, often I find residual litter and bottles outside of the houses, which recently happened with the property in question around Halloween time.

I do hope that as a long-term resident with a young family my concerns will be taken into account. Should you wish to have any further information I am happy to correspond further or speak by phone.

OBJECTION TO RENEWAL OF LICENCE

We act on behalf of Aberdeen Energy Park Limited ("**AEPL**"), who are tenants under a ground lease by Aberdeen City Council of the affected premises known as Aberdeen Energy Park. The extent of AEPL's ground lease title is shown on the plan attached as Appendix 1.

We understand that a Street Trader's Licence was granted to a Maureen Ross permitting her to operate a snack van as a Street Trader on the east side of Exploration Drive (29 metres north of the junction where Exploration Drive meets Claymore Drive), all in terms of the Civic Government (Scotland) Act 1982. The location of the snack van is shown on the plan attached as Appendix 1. Photographs of the snack van are also attached as Appendix 2. The snack van is located on a loop road within the boundaries of AEPL's ground lease title (known as the "Energy Park"). The loop road's main purpose is to facilitate access and egress to the Energy Park and surrounding areas and is publicly adopted.

The snack van has been in situ since August 2016. The Licence is due to expire on 27th November 2016. We understand from direct contact with David McKane your Licensing Enforcement Officer that the operator has not yet submitted an application for renewal but on the assumption that an application is forthcoming, on behalf of AEPL, we object to the renewal of the Licence on the following grounds:







- The premises are not suitable or convenient for the conduct of the activity having regard to the location, character or condition of the premises, vehicle or vessel; the nature and extent of the proposed activity; and the possibility of undue public nuisance, public order or public safety; and
- there is other good reason for refusing the application.

The specific grounds of AEPL's objection are as follows:-

- In terms of the ground lease, AEPL are under an obligation to maintain a high class business environment for all sub-tenants, occupiers and third party users of the Energy Park. Aside from the adopted loop road (and associated footpath and verges) which are publicly maintained, AEPL manage all adjacent ground as a high quality landscaped environment. AEPL have invested substantially in the landscaping, signage, public realm and regeneration of buildings on the Energy Park in order to achieve this and will continue to do so. The presence of the snack van is considered to be detrimental to and at odds with the overall environment and character of the Energy Park, resulting in a negative image and adversely impacting on its wider use, amenity and the ability to attract high calibre occupants. The introduction of the snack bar is already causing problems with litter control in the area we are charged with maintaining all the common landscaped areas including litter picking and this is adding to our estate maintenance costs.
- AEPL have also invested heavily in the provision of high standard catering facilities at the Energy Park known as The Grub café to serve the sub-tenants, occupiers and third party users. The snack van is located close to The Grub café and is negatively affecting trade. In the event that the operators of The Grub café considered that it was no longer viable this would have a very significant and detrimental impact on the amenity and marketability of the Energy Park to potential occupants.
- 3 Since the granting of the Licence, the detrimental impacts on the Energy Park include increased volume of traffic, increased congestion and parking on the loop road by vehicles (including cars and large trucks and lorries) which previously had no cause to enter the Energy Park premises. The attached photos in Appendix 2 show a fairly typical daily occurrence of lorries parking illegally on the double yellow located on the access road. These were only recently installed by the Council to address a previously noted problem of congestion and parking of vehicles too close to this road junction. The location of the snack bar and the attending vehicles has now exacerbated this problem.





- 4 Under the ground lease by the Council, AEPL and their sub-tenants / occupiers are subject to strict use conditions, as follows:
 - (i) purposes falling within use classes 4 and 5 of the Schedule to the Town & Country Planning (Uses Classes) (Scotland) Order 1997 ("the Order") where such businesses are significantly engaged in research and research and development of products and processes; and
 - (ii) uses falling within use classes 1, 2, 3, 6, 10 and 11 of the Order where such uses are ancillary to the main uses carried on under the ground lease (as above).

Accordingly, AEPL would be prohibited by the terms of their ground lease from permitting a Street Trader or snack van of this nature to occupy and use the Energy Park. It is therefore not appropriate for the snack van to be located on the road within the Energy Park; the Council have provided for restrictive uses within the terms of the ground lease which AEPL must comply with but are then permitting, for all practical purposes within the Energy Park, an activity and use which would breach those lease terms if carried out or allowed by AEPL. We do not consider that this is appropriate or in the spirit of the ground lease agreement between the Council and AEPL.

We understand that the Licence was issued subject to standard conditions applicable to a Street Trader's Licence under the Civic Government (Scotland) Act 1982. Standard Condition 11. requires that the Licence holder provides a bin or receptacle in close proximity to the van and we can see no evidence that this is being provided.

For the reasons stated above, it is not appropriate for street trading activities to take place at this location and the Licence should not be renewed upon expiry on 27th November 2016.










