This proposal could impact on carers that are attending to residents within controlled parking zones; this being due to the situation where some residents located in the Outer City Centre Zones or Peripheral Parking Zones take up the option of purchasing a flexible permit that can be used on any vehicle associated with the property, thereby providing a resident with the opportunity to let a carer use the flexible permit.

Age

These measures only affect those with vehicles who wish to park within controlled parking zones, during the hours of their operation. Further parking opportunities are available across the city at no, low or

variable costs which remain unaffected though these options may not be in such	close proximity to the
individual's residence. Permits are available for 3, 6 or 12 months enabling the co	st to be dispersed across
the year, with the maximum proposed cost for a city centre location permit being	£1 per day.

### Disability

The possibility of exploring a 'Carer permit' option could be considered; albeit, if progressed, this would require an amendment to Traffic Regulation Orders, which could take in the region of 9 to 12 months.

For those with disabilities, there is the 'Blue Badge' parking scheme, that beyond providing 'close proximity' parking opportunities in dedicated bays, provides an exemption from any charges associated with general on-street 'permit / pay & display / voucher' parking bays established by the Council.
