Opening remarks from the Convener	The Convener welcomed the new members of the Forum and briefly summarised membership and constitutional matters specifically focusing on the role of substitutes and the Forum's quorum. Training Programme – Licensing Standards Officers	Tara-Erin Gilchrist gave the Forum an overview of the role and remit of a Licensing Standards Officer and explained that they have 3 main areas of responsibility; providing information and guidance to the Licensed Trade and other relevant stakeholders, ensuring compliance with legislation and offering a mediation service and their primary function was to ensure that the five licensing	To thank Tara-Erin Gilchrist for the informative presentation.	

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	<ul> <li>objectives were being applied and fully met by licensed premises in Aberdeen.</li> <li>Tara-Erin also outlined the powers LSO's have at their disposal; including as a last resort a referral to a Premises Licence Review. Furthermore she also explained that LSO's liaise with multiple partners including Police Scotland, Environmental Health and planning and legal agents.</li> </ul>		
	Tara-Erin then answered a number of questions from the Forum. Firstly she explained that an LSO's daily responsibilities were varied which could include administration and inspections and that the inspections themselves could vary between tea rooms and nightclubs.		
	Tara-Erin also gave an indication of the most common recurring issues she experiences. She explained that displaying notices was a common issue for On Licensed premises but also noted that declarations which did not meet the mandatory conditions and a lack of training for staff were issues for both On and Off Licensed premises. Tara-Erin also explained that the most recurring complaints come from the city centre but noise complaints are greater in residential neighbourhoods.		
	Further questions were also asked in relation to pricing and Tara-Erin elaborated that a key part of their roles was to ensure reasonable		

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		pricing of alcohol relative to soft drinks to avoid a tacit incentive for customers to drink alcohol because it was relatively cheaper and also to ensure that tap water remained free of charge.		
		Finally Tara-Erin also went into further detail about partnership working and explained that LSO's liaise with Police Scotland to pass on information but do not formally collaborate to target areas in Aberdeen. Tara-Erin also explained that she must report blocked fire exits to the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service but reiterated that LSO's were not Environmental Health Officers and relied on their common sense when to report breaches such as plainly visible deterioration in a building's structure.

7.	Monitoring and Evaluating Scotland's Alcohol	The Convener briefly summarised the report which noted that across Scotland alcohol sales are falling, deaths from alcohol have	To note the report.	

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Strategy (MESAS) Fourth Annual Report	fallen by 35% since 2003 but still remain 1.4 times higher than in 1981 and that hospitalisations have fallen by 25% since 2007/8 yet are still 1.3 times higher than in 1991/92.		
	There then followed a discussion on the report with members noting that further studies would be needed to get a more in-depth evaluation on the relationship between alcohol and poverty, unemployment and other social and economic inequalities within Aberdeen's communities. Shamini Omnes mentioned that NHS Grampian had conducted pilot studies on such relationships in Torry and would be prepared to present these findings in a future workshop session. 	Furthermore, it was also noted that changes to legislation such as the recent zero tolerance ban on drink driving had a significant impact on societal behaviour towards alcohol consumption but it was again reiterated that this was a general perspective and more demographic information was needed to determine the impact on target groups and communities.		
	However concerns were raised that this report was too narrowly focussed on the negative impact of alcohol on health and that representatives from the licensed trade would welcome the inclusion of the positive impact the licensed trade has on society; such as		

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		employment in future reports. The Forum also discussed the attitude of young people towards alcohol and members cited several studies and news articles which recorded that young people were drinking less alcohol than previous generations. ## LOCAL LICENSING FORUM – WORKSHOP SESSION

Discussion points:-

## Licensing Objective 1 – Preventing Crime and Disorder

Dave Bliss briefly recapped the pertinent points he made during the presentation at the previous Forum meeting and then opened up the meeting for comments and questions from Forum members.

## Discussion –

How can the Forum make an impact and influence the decision making process of the Licensing Board and our partners? We need to do this to ensure we are not passive and have a purpose to inform strategies and influence social norms.

How do we know if we are making a difference? We need to develop a performance management framework to measure change; perhaps initially focussing on the number of admissions & incidents recorded and data on domestic abuse rates. This will help the Forum form the basis for recommendations to the Licensing Board.

Is the data on the impact of alcohol from various agencies reaching the right partners, could the Forum become more involved in this area? Can we integrate with existing forums to ensure better co-ordination and use of resources and adoption of best practice?

It's evident that the NHS and other health partners are significantly behind the Police in terms of data collection and analysis.

Police Scotland can provide data for the Forum but Inspector Rae cautioned that this may be too general and it would be difficult to draw robust conclusions without drilling deeper into the data to include evidence such as demographic information.

Serious violence in the City Centre has dropped significantly in recent years. Inspector Rae informed the Forum that in 1997 there were roughly 240 violent crimes in the Queen Street sub division alone; yet by 2014 there were only 116 violent crimes across the whole city.

Why is violent crime dropping? What changes have been made? The Forum surmised that greater partnership working and more proactivity from fully accredited door stewards have nipped potential incidents in the bud before they could develop into something more serious. Also schemes such as Challenge 25 and the creation of UNIGHT have helped; in addition to pride at Purple Flag accreditation and social and economic changes which have made drunkenness less socially acceptable.

The Convener intimated that Licensed Trade representatives may find it beneficial to agree to share information with regards to trends in alcohol consumption and footfall in their premises with the forum to compare data and begin the progress of developing a performance management framework.
