TITLE OF REPORT Update Report on Social Care and Wellbeing Annual Grant making programme

REPORT NUMBER: SCW/09/035

# 1. PURPOSE OF REPORT

The purpose of this report is to update members as to the current position in respect of voluntary sector grants from the Social Care and Wellbeing budget. The report identifies the impact of making savings across this budget following decisions made (Council Budget meeting on 11 February 2010). During 2009/10 the value of grants awarded in total was £300,359.57. Grants were made to twenty-one organisations. Last year, organisations were informed in November of the then new grant making framework and invited to make applications to the fund on this basis. Just over one hundred organisations made such applications. This year this process has been put on hold awaiting further decisions as to if and to what extent this programme may go ahead.

Mainstream funding grants which have already been agreed at Council Budget, are marked with an asterisk.

## 2. RECOMMENDATION(S)

- 1) Elected Members are asked to consider the grant awards not yet agreed and the recommendations of the officers in regard of these.
- 2) To note the funding already agreed (£131,700) and approve the mainstreaming of the amounts recommended (£71,463.57) and the subsequent savings (£97,196) from the grant fund.
- 3) To agree that the Director of Social Care and Wellbeing will write to the organisations, where funding is to cease, highlighting short term transitional support may be available
- 4) Approve the discontinuation of the Annual Grant making programme from this year.

### 3. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

In previous years the total fund available has been up to £300,000. This figure has been suggested as a saving as part of the budget reduction measures.

## 5. OTHER IMPLICATIONS

Some of the organisations in receipt of funds from this grant are to receive the majority of their income from this source and are likely to close if they do not receive this grant.

## 6. REPORT

The Social Care Annual Grant funding in Aberdeen has tended to support long term service provision rather than provide start up, innovation and opportunity for new ways of working.

For the financial year 2009/10, a new Social Care Annual Grant making framework was introduced. Implementing a grant-making framework to manage the SCAG grant opened up this source of funding for new organisations to apply, thus creating a more competitive funding stream. This was welcome by the voluntary sector, introducing greater transparency to the process and with the same level of funding, saw several new organisations in receipt of grants.

The table below shows the organisations in receipt of a grant and the recommendations of officers in respect of those monies for 2010/2011.
