a- What are the aims and intended effects of this proposal?	 The SEAP's aim is to reduce emissions and provide alternative forms of energy generation across the city of Aberdeen. In doing so there are a number of benefits that will arise including, but not limited to, the following: Improved air quality – affecting all citizens but more so those who are vulnerable including those with people with respiratory disabilities, older people and people who are not so strong or able. Greater digital connectivity and energy demand side management. Community power generation. Building retrofits, improving housing living conditions. Expansion of the district heating network – offering viable energy alternatives away from electrical usage – helping to alleviate fuel poverty through reduced energy consumption costs. Creation of new jobs. Promotion of alternative modes of transport encouraging greater citizen mobility – ensuring accessibility for all.

Implementation of projects arising from the SEAP programme will help to advance equality of opportunity, eliminate discrimination and foster good relations, as follows:

represented groups. This will also work towards the aims of tackling prejudice and promoting understanding.
