Resident from Ferryhill and Ruthrieston Area	I think that Willowbank Road is a more suitable boundary for the city centre community council	Recommendation to Council is to adopt proposal 1 – extend the City Centre boundary down to Willowbank Road.
Resident from Ferryhill and Ruthrieston Area	<p>Unfortunately I was unable to attend the meetings regarding the Ferryhill and Ruthrieston CC and the City Centre CC consultation. However, I was wanting to express my preference to option one being proposed. I have previously tried to stand for Ferryhill and Ruthrieston Community Council, however unfortunately it was unable to be formed.</p> <p>However, I have always felt that Ferryhill is divided with those in the south of the community having very much different concerns and issues to those nearer the city centre. That is why I would prefer that the 1st option being proposed is adopted as many of the issues faced by those like myself in Springbank Street are shared with other residents in the city centre. All the facilities I use are in the city centre and therefore it would be good to be able to be part of an active community council</p>	Recommendation to Council is to adopt proposal 1 - extend the City Centre boundary down to Willowbank Road.
City Centre Community Council	<p>The City Centre Community Council would like to note that we feel that proposal 1 which extends the boundary down to Willowbank Road would be our preferred proposal.</p> <p>This is due to a number of comments over the year from residents within that area that have stated they feel more part of the city centre than Ferryhill.</p>	Recommendation to Council is to adopt proposal 1 - extend the City Centre boundary down to Willowbank Road.

<p>Dyce and Stoneywood Community Council</p>	<p>We support the revised proposals for establishing community councils and the complaints procedure.</p> <p>We support the proposed revised boundary between Dyce and Stoneywood CC and Bucksburn and Newhills CC. This is in accord with the views of some residents of 'old Stoneywood' but will allow DSCC to continue to serve residents living to the east of the railway line.</p> <p>We do not agree with the proposed name change to Dyce Community Council, given that we will still represent much of Stoneywood and we propose that our name is not changed.</p>	<p>Recommendation to Council is to adopt proposal 1, extending the boundary to take the AECC, Market Street and down Stoneywood Road into the Bucksburn and Newhills CC.</p> <p>The name of the Community Council will not be changed, this was removed as a proposal during stage 1 consultation.</p>

Public Consultation Exercise – Dyce Community Centre – 24 April

The event was held at the Community Centre during the day which was busy with parents dropping off/collecting children from school and nursey. There was also a local group using the centre from 1pm for their weekly game of whist who were mainly local residents within Dyce.

Additional Comments received:

- Stoneywood area in my opinion is definitely part of Bucksburn and not Dyce
- The new AECC I think would be Dyce however the area of Stoneywood as on the map should be within Bucksburn
- Polo Gardens and the new development at Stoneywood should be within Dyce with the other side of Stoneywood Road being within Bucksburn.

- The AECC in my opinion should be within Bucksburn as I don't think that I will be impacted to the same level as residents within Bucksburn. The noise, travel to and from the venue would be more of an issue to folk in Bucksburn.

Based on the outcome of the Public Consultation events in Bucksburn and Dyce, the recommendation to Council is to adopt proposal 1, extending the boundary to take the AECC, Market Street and down Stoneywood Road into the Bucksburn and Newhills Community Council. Proposal 1 also extends the boundary to the west side to encompass Brimmond Hill and the surrounding area.
